Mayor Ekstrand and Village Attorney DeBellis explained that this new local law enables an outside company to monitor "zombie" houses and provides the Village with information on those properties in order to better manage them so they do not fall into disrepair, at no cost to the Village taxpayer.

RESOLVED (#2022-09-16), to enact a new Local Law to amend Chapter 419 – Property Maintenance.

RESOLVED (#2022-09-21), to approve Core & Main as sole source provider for the installation of the Sensus M400 Basestation at a cost of \$22,357.15.

RESOLVED (#2022-09-22), to hire Ronald Demarrais as a Building Inspector at a salary of \$75,000 per year.

RESOLVED (#2022-09-23), to approve the reconstruction of Melville Road (from the railroad to Main St.), Leonard Street, Jerome Drive (from new pavement line to Leonard St.), Hardwick Place, Adrienne Court, Ridge Road (from Lafayette Road to end), Paine Avenue, Park Avenue, Lafayette Road, Jefferson Road and Sherman Road under the requirements contract with Roadwork Ahead in the amount of \$548,729.60.

SALARY INCREASE – Upon a motion made by Trustee Parisi and seconded by Trustee Addeo, it was unanimously,

RESOLVED (#2022-09-24), to approve a salary increase of \$3.00 per hour for all Firehouse Maintainers.

FD FITNESS PROVIDER – Upon a motion made by Trustee Parisi and seconded by Trustee Addeo, it was unanimously,

RESOLVED (#2022-09-25), to approve Blink Fitness as the designated fitness provider for the Farmingdale Fire Department at a cost of \$170 per membership for 50 members totaling \$8,500.

NEW AMBULANCE – Upon a motion made by Trustee Priestley and seconded by Trustee Parisi, it was unanimously,

RESOLVED (#2022-09-26), to purchase a new ambulance for the Farmingdale Fire Department at a cost of \$242,766 with a trade-in credit of \$25,000 for the existing ambulance on delivery of the new ambulance to the Farmingdale Fire Department along with a grant of \$200,000 secured by New York State Senator Kevin Thomas for a net cost to the Village of \$17,766.

PIPES & DRUMS BAND PAYMENTS – Upon a motion made by Trustee Priestley and seconded by Trustee Addeo, it was unanimously,

RESOLVED (#2022-09-27), to approve payment to Nassau County Firefighter's Pipes and Drums in the amount of \$1,500 and payment to Nassau County Police Emerald Society Pipes and Drums Band in the amount of \$1,500 for their performance (total of \$3,000) in the Half Way to St. Patrick's Day Parade.

BEAUTIFICATION – Trustee Parisi reported the following:

- The Village will be keeping current floral arrangements on the street and in the parking lots until approximately the end of October and then prepare for the holidays.
- The 5 Corners Park rehabilitation has been approved by Nassau County and that bidding will be done in the near future. The grant from the county is for \$150,000 and the Village's total financial commitment is approximately \$12,000. A special thank you to Nassau County Deputy County Executive Brian Schneider for his assistance through the approval process.
- The Village will be receiving a gift of 6 sculptures from the estate of former Village resident Sven Brost. One will be place on the Village Green, one at 5 Corners Park and one in each of the 4 large downtown parking lots.

OLD BUSINESS - None

CORRESPONDENCE – Mayor Ekstrand stated that the Village had received three letters: a thank you letter for the installations of plantings at the Harrison Street recharge

basin, a letter from NCPD Commissioner Ryder and a letter from Sttaler Associates withdrawing their application for the reconstruction of 331 Main Street.

FAIR HOUSING COMPLAINTS & COMMENTS - None

PUBLIC COMMENT – A discussion began on the following topics:

- A resident thanked the Village for installation of a post and rail fence on Thomas Powell Blvd. and Yoakum Street.
- A resident asked if the FAR calculations were done on the withdrawn Staller project. Mayor Ekstrand and Superintendent Fellman said that final plans were never received.
- A resident said that shrubs were blocking the sidewalk at Powell Place and Melville Road. DPW will investigate and remedy the problem.
- A resident said that the Highway Department did a great job cleaning up the Village after the two Music on Main events this summer.
- A resident asked about the potential for metered parking in the Village. Mayor Ekstrand responded that the Village is in the process of evaluating and making plans. If enacted, Village residents would be given a sticker free of charge so residents could park for free.
- A resident asked about the possibility of repaving Main Street from the traffic loops at the intersection of Route 109 and Main Street to the area that was previously repaved. Mayor Ekstrand said the Village would look into it.
- A resident commented on the Kumon awning, which is in poor condition, and other properties with temporary signage on Main Street.
- A resident asked about using the CVS parking lot for co-op parking during sealcoating. Administrator Harty contacted the property owner and they declined. The Village is accommodating the temporarily displaced vehicles in Parking Lot 4, permits have been issued.

EXECUTIVE SESSION, upon a motion made by Trustee Priestley and seconded by Trustee Addeo, it was unanimously,

RESOLVED (#2022-09-28), to move to Executive Session.

Upon a motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously,

RESOLVED (#2022-09-29), to reconvene the meeting.
