1 2 3 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: Good 4 evening, everyone. It's Mayor Ralph, and 5 we welcome you to the Board of Trustees of 6 the Village of Farmingdale's work session, 7 Monday, January 25th, at 2021. 8 As most of you know, we start off 9 our meeting with the Pledge of Allegiance, 10 and then a moment followed by a moment of 11 silence for our first responders and our 12 military service men and women. 13 So, if you could join with me, 14 place your hand over the heart and recite with me the Pledge of Allegiance. 15 16 (WHEREUPON, all present recited 17 the Pledge of Allegiance, after which the 18 following transpired:)

MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: And now a
moment of silence for our first responders
and our military men and women who are
defending freedom throughout the globe.

(WHEREUPON, a moment of silence was

- 2 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: Thank you.
- 3 Thank you very much.
- 4 Our first item on tonight's agenda
- 5 is a resolution to acknowledge the return
- of the 2020/2021 tax roll and warrants and
- 7 report of unpaid taxes, pursuant to
- 8 Section 1436 of the New York State Real
- 9 Property Tax Law.
- 10 Motion to approve.
- 11 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: So moved.
- 12 TRUSTEE ANTHONY ADDEO: So moved.
- 13 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: Second?
- 14 TRUSTEE WALTER PRIESTLEY: I'll
- 15 second.
- 16 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: All in
- 17 favor?
- 18 (WHEREUPON, there was a unanimous,
- 19 affirmative vote of the Board Members
- 20 present.)
- 21 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: Bill is
- 22 waiting to be left in -- let in. So,
- 23 Kevin, do you see him?
- 24 KEVIN WOOD: I do not see Bill.
- 25 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: Bill said

- 2 he's waiting to be let in.
- 3 TRUSTEE WALTER PRIESTLEY: Could
- 4 you ask him if he's a 917?
- 5 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: Bill -- oh,
- 6 yeah, okay. But I don't think so. Nine
- 7 one --
- 8 STEPHEN FELLMAN: That's his Social
- 9 Security Number, 917.
- 10 KEVIN WOOD: I'll work with Bill on
- 11 the back end. He does not have the right
- 12 link. I'll work with him.
- 13 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: Okay.
- 14 KEVIN WOOD: All right?
- 15 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: Yup. Good.
- 16 Thank you, Kevin.
- 17 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: As a general
- 18 rule, 917 is a City number, you know.
- 19 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: Yeah.
- 20 BRIAN HARTY: Somebody's got a cell
- 21 number.
- 22 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: Yeah, yeah.
- Fire Department: Brian, do we have
- 24 anything with the Fire Department?
- 25 BRIAN HARTY: Not really. Only,

- 1 1-25-21
- 2 other than, you know, Bill and I talked
- 3 about leasing the chief's car. I'm
- 4 getting lease quotes from my other lease
- 5 quote. I forwarded it to Bill for review,
- 6 instead of purchasing the vehicle
- 7 outright, so that we would have a softer
- 8 budget implication.
- 9 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: And then
- 10 what will we do? Buy it after six years?
- 11 BRIAN HARTY: Yeah, it's a one
- 12 dollar buy out at the end of the lease --
- 13 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: Right.
- 14 BRIAN HARTY: (Continuing) -- next
- 15 year.
- 16 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: However, we
- 17 -- just so everybody knows, we couldn't do
- 18 that with the sirens, lights and mobile
- 19 radios. That, we have to pay up front.
- 20 That's not -- we could not incorporate
- 21 that into the lease.
- 22 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: Right. And
- 23 -- and -- okay.
- 24 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: And
- 25 that's --

- 1 1-25-21
- 2 BRIAN HARTY: Yeah, somebody --
- 3 separate vendor down here typically.
- 4 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: Yeah, we use
- 5 a state contractor vendor.
- I guess we're having a little
- 7 problem getting Bill in, but...
- 8 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: He had the
- 9 wrong link.
- 10 KEVIN WOOD: I sent him the right
- 11 one. We're good.
- 12 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: Okay.
- 13 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: So, Bill is
- 14 a missing link? Just saying... Just
- 15 saying...
- 16 STEPHEN FELLMAN: I have to lend
- 17 him Macklin (phonetic), my son, when we
- 18 have these meetings.
- 19 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: There he
- 20 is. Now, we can't see you, Bill.
- 21 STEPHEN FELLMAN: There's his eyes.
- 22 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: Bill,
- 23 you're --
- 24 DEPUTY MAYOR WILLIAM BARRETT:
- 25 Sorry for the delay. I just saw Kevin's

- 1 1-25-21
- 2 -- I had the wrong -- I guess the wrong
- 3 login.
- 4 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: Yeah.
- 5 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: Okay. As
- 6 long as you're here.
- 7 Bill, the only thing we did is the
- 8 resolution for the tax -- to accept the
- 9 tax roll.
- 10 DEPUTY MAYOR WILLIAM BARRETT: Okay.
- 11 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: The -- which
- 12 I assume you say yes.
- 13 DEPUTY MAYOR WILLIAM BARRETT:
- 14 Yeah, no, I do. Is it -- is it a whole
- 15 lot more than what it's been in previous
- 16 years?
- 17 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: Well, we
- 18 sent it to you.
- 19 DEPUTY MAYOR WILLIAM BARRETT: I
- 20 know, I saw it. I just don't recall what
- 21 it was in previous years. I think it's
- 22 fifty-seven thousand now.
- 23 BRIAN HARTY: It's more than --
- 24 it's -- it's about twenty-nine --
- 25 twenty-nine properties. I don't recall

- 2 the number, off the top of my head.
- 3 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: Yeah.
- 4 DEPUTY MAYOR WILLIAM BARRETT:
- 5 Yeah, 57,000, I recall.
- 6 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: Yeah, I --
- 7 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: Yeah,
- 8 that's what the total was, Bill, yes.
- 9 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: Yeah, I
- 10 don't recognize the total as being
- 11 anything out of what it usually, normally
- 12 is, Bill.
- 13 DEPUTY MAYOR WILLIAM BARRETT:
- 14 Good. Okay.
- 15 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: It might be
- 16 a little -- little -- little off here or
- 17 there, but it's -- it's pretty much
- 18 steady.
- 19 DEPUTY MAYOR WILLIAM BARRETT:
- 20 Good. Okay.
- 21 TRUSTEE ANTHONY ADDEO: I have a
- 22 question.
- 23 CNA (phonetic) we get a bid instead
- 24 of on a daily rate to have all of the
- 25 trees and stumps removed, one price? That

- 1 1-25-21
- 2 bid was for a day.
- 3 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: Brian, could
- 4 you explain how -- why it was done this
- 5 way and so everybody knows.
- 6 BRIAN HARTY: Well, it's to try to
- 7 get the maximum amount of work done in a
- 8 particular day. And we asked for a daily
- 9 rate because we thought by getting a daily
- 10 rate we would keep the cost somewhat down.
- 11 Make choices on the daily rates rather
- 12 than -- rather than have a one lump sum
- 13 bid. One lump sum bid on this would
- 14 probably come in somewhere around -- the
- 15 bids he engaged were -- for the estimate
- of time is you'd be looking at 17,
- 17 \$18,000, probably. Somewhere in that
- 18 range. So this way with the daily rate,
- 19 we're able to budgetarily look at this in
- 20 a different way. We can say, okay, we'll
- 21 do a day's worth of tree removal and two
- 22 day's worth of stump griding. You could
- 23 get rid of all the stumps and the good
- 24 preponderance of the trees, and next
- 25 year's budget year, we'll come back for

- 1 1-25-21
- 2 another day and finish it up.
- 3 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: Can I just
- 4 ask --
- 5 BRIAN HARTY: (Inaudible)
- 6 flexibility that you wouldn't have in a
- 7 bid.
- 8 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: Okay, can I
- 9 just ask that on both of these sheets the
- 10 stump grinding and the tree removal, that
- 11 we do not do anything at Five Corners
- 12 until we get the 2006 environmental bond
- 13 back from Nassau County. Have we signed
- 14 that yet?
- 15 BRIAN HARTY: I haven't seen it. I
- 16 haven't seen it yet. Is it back?
- 17 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: Yeah, we
- 18 have it. We got it. I sent it to you and
- 19 I sent it to Claudio and Ralph. Claudio
- 20 read it. He said that we could sign it.
- 21 We made a resolution last week, I believe,
- 22 to have you to sign it.
- 23 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: Yeah, to
- 24 sign it.
- 25 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: Yeah.

- 1 1-25-21
- 2 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: I just
- 3 assumed you were signing it, Brian, when
- 4 it wasn't in my envelope to sign.
- 5 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: Yes, but
- 6 you --
- 7 BRIAN HARTY: (Inaudible) tomorrow
- 8 we'll take care of it.
- 9 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: Okay.
- 10 BRIAN HARTY: We won't do anything
- 11 -- we won't do anything at Five Corners
- 12 until the contract is signed; how's that?
- 13 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: Correct.
- 14 Until we get it back from them. Because
- 15 that will be part of the grant that we get
- 16 from --
- 17 BRIAN HARTY: Sure. Okay.
- 18 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: Okay.
- 19 BRIAN HARTY: Okay.
- 20 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: We'll just
- 21 take that --
- 22 BRIAN HARTY: Very good.
- 23 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: Ralph you
- 24 do --
- 25 BRIAN HARTY: (Inaudible) tree guy

- 1 1-25-21 2 (inaudible)
- 3 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: Yes.
- 4 BRIAN HARTY: We could do that but
- 5 there's two trees that -- two, three,
- 6 trees and the neighbor up there has been
- 7 complaining about for some time. So I
- 8 don't know how long it's going to take to
- 9 get the contract back from the County --
- 10 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: I asked
- 11 about it. They said we should get it back
- 12 within a couple of weeks of signing it and
- 13 getting it back to them.
- 14 So I would think if you guys get it
- 15 signed tomorrow, you send it back to
- 16 Andrea or with the Nassau County DPW, and
- 17 she said -- because it's been reviewed and
- 18 approved -- so then it just needs to be
- 19 signed. She said it would be a couple of
- 20 weeks. So I would hope that we could hold
- 21 off and everything could be taken -- I
- 22 don't want us starting to do things over
- 23 there and then for them to say well,
- 24 nananana (sic), we didn't do it the right
- 25 way. So I would hope we could hold off a

- 1 1-25-21
- 2 little bit longer.
- BRIAN HARTY: We were going to take
- 4 three trees out of there as soon as we
- 5 could because they're pretty rotten and
- 6 then the neighbor's concerned it's going
- 7 to come down on his house. So that was
- 8 one of the impetuses of this. They
- 9 figured two or three trees in Five Corners
- 10 Park that we were looking to take out as
- 11 far as this round is concerned. There's
- 12 going to be considerably more tree removal
- 13 up there, Cheryl, or within Five Corners
- 14 when you do the job completely.
- 15 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: Right. I
- 16 understand.
- 17 BRIAN HARTY: I think that should
- 18 be bid as a package, just on that job
- 19 alone, to -- so we keep a delineation on
- 20 that just for that particular job.
- 21 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: That makes a
- 22 lot of sense.
- 23 BRIAN HARTY: To keep it delineated
- 24 as this is only for the County, because
- 25 we'll do everything for the County, and

- 1 1-25-21
- 2 the County's methodology. There won't be
- 3 any questions about reimbursement then and
- 4 so on. So we'll put that together as an
- 5 entire package and get bids on all of
- 6 that, just what's going to be done on that
- 7 particular job alone. I think that's the
- 8 best way to approach it.
- 9 I'd like to get those trees out of
- 10 there because the neighbor has been
- 11 complaining about this for quite some time
- 12 and we've been chasing Stapleton with no
- 13 success, unfortunately, because they're --
- 14 very limited amount of time that they can
- 15 devote to us because of their -- they only
- 16 have three guys and it's a daily rate of
- 17 about 1200 bucks.
- 18 So I think we should do these trees
- 19 in -- and the trees that were designated
- 20 -- because here's a lot more to come out
- 21 in the renovation that we're going to do
- 22 in the park in a couple of months from
- 23 now. Okay?
- 24 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: Okay.
- 25 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: Brian, if

- 1 1-25-21
- 2 the trees are hazardous, they have to come
- 3 -- if the trees are hazardous --
- 4 BRIAN HARTY: I --
- 5 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: (Continuing)
- 6 -- and we know that they are, they have to
- 7 come out as soon as we can take them out.
- 8 BRIAN HARTY: They've got some
- 9 considerable rot in them. So I would not
- 10 like to delay it any longer than we have
- 11 to, so... And this has been a -- you
- 12 know, we've been delaying this with the --
- 13 with this particular that we promised them
- 14 for a couple of months now that we were
- 15 going to get over there and get this done,
- 16 so... And Stapleton hasn't really been
- 17 able to get in and get the work done.
- 18 That's why I want to proceed on this
- 19 basis.
- 20 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: Stapleton is
- 21 -- well, I'll just stop and say fine.
- 22 BRIAN HARTY: They're just too
- 23 small. When they've got a lot of work to
- 24 get done, they just don't have the ability
- 25 and the number of people and the equipment

- 1 1-25-21
- 2 and so on to do -- like Bank does or
- 3 somebody else. So I really think we
- 4 should proceed with this and get this
- 5 done. Okay.
- 6 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: Did we let
- 7 Claudio in?
- 8 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: Well...
- 9 KEVIN WOOD: Yes, we did. He's
- 10 just --
- 11 CLAUDIO DE BELLIS, ESQ.: I'm here.
- 12 Can you hear me?
- 13 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: Okay,
- 14 Claudio.
- 15 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: We hear
- 16 you. We have no picture of you.
- 17 CLAUDIO DE BELLIS, ESQ.: Listen,
- 18 it's like pitch dark right now. You know
- 19 what, I don't think you want to see the
- 20 environs of where I'm at right now.
- 21 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: Okay, fine.
- 22 CLAUDIO DE BELLIS, ESQ.: It's not
- 23 as beautiful as the interior of your
- 24 beautiful homes here.
- 25 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: Okay, fine.

- 1 1-25-21
- Moving right along. Stevie, you're
- 3 on. Building Department.
- 4 BRIAN HARTY: I'll --
- 5 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: Do you have
- 6 something else, Brian?
- 7 BRIAN HARTY: Do we want to do a
- 8 resolution in support of this? I mean,
- 9 you know, Anthony asked the question. I
- 10 mean just like, you know, we got a green
- 11 light on this to go ahead with the tree
- 12 removal and the stump grinding.
- 13 TRUSTEE WALTER PRIESTLEY: Do we
- 14 need a resolution?
- 15 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: Yeah. We
- 16 need a --
- 17 TRUSTEE WALTER PRIESTLEY: Okay,
- 18 I'll make a motion.
- 19 DEPUTY MAYOR WILLIAM BARRETT: I'll
- 20 make the resolution.
- 21 I'll second it.
- 22 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: All in
- 23 favor?
- 24 (WHEREUPON, there was a unanimous,
- 25 affirmative vote of the Board members

- 1 1-25-21
- 2 present.)
- 3 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: Okay.
- 4 Anthony will be going in and out, as you
- 5 can see, for various reasons.
- 6 TRUSTEE WALTER PRIESTLEY:
- 7 Understood.
- 8 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: Stevie?
- 9 STEPHEN FELLMAN: First I have to
- 10 share a funny story. The Mayor knows
- 11 already.
- 12 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: That's why
- 13 I'm laughing.
- 14 STEPHEN FELLMAN: Yeah. We thought
- 15 it would be a great idea to talk about
- 16 stuff at Gerngras Park. So I volunteered
- 17 my son with his new drone I got him for
- 18 Christmas, that we will buy a nice aerial
- 19 photo of the park that we can use as like
- 20 a site plan. So I bring him down there
- 21 yesterday, (inaudible) it's since it's
- 22 winter, there's no leaves on the trees. I
- 23 bring him down there, we get this thing
- 24 going. He rides up -- it's locked -- it's
- 25 all locked up. No problem. He lifts it

- 1 1-25-21
- 2 up, it flies over the fence, gets it in
- 3 the middle of the park, starts up, stops
- 4 at 20 feet, we get big red warnings on his
- 5 phone, "You are in an air controlled FAA
- 6 flight zone. This drone will be shut down
- 7 in the next 60 seconds and it will not
- 8 operate for the next 30 minutes." He's
- 9 like we gotta get it out of the park
- 10 because we don't have -- use the park. So
- 11 we're trying to get the thing out of the
- 12 park and it shut itself down and went down
- 13 to the ground on its own. I mean -- so,
- 14 apparently --
- 15 TRUSTEE WALTER PRIESTLEY:
- 16 Interesting.
- 17 STEPHEN FELLMAN: (Continuing) --
- 18 apparently, it's pretty sophisticated --
- 19 the air control -- more than I realized --
- 20 this drone is about the size of an iPhone
- 21 and it picked it up immediately because
- 22 it's connected to your phone and the
- 23 software reads everything. It's crazy.
- 24 So I apologize. We did get a Google map
- 25 picture that, hopefully, will be helpful.

- 1 1-25-21
- 2 That being said, we're moving ahead
- 3 with St. Luke's. We heard from the fire
- 4 marshal. So we're going to move forward
- 5 with the permit for St. Luke's. They're
- 6 renovating the old bank building on
- 7 Conklin Street there as part of the
- 8 church.
- 9 We got the letter from the lawyers
- 10 for 37 Potter Street, the plating company.
- 11 That's important to get them back on line,
- 12 but also it's a pretty good permit fee.
- 13 And also we're starting to move
- 14 forward on getting the permits ready for
- 15 the Fairfield -- for the three fountain --
- 16 I call it Three Fountain Park. Those two
- 17 projects, along with the plating company,
- 18 are like \$60,000 in permit fees. So,
- 19 they're good ones for the Village.
- Nothing new on Robbie Lee, other
- 21 than he had a death of a friend in
- 22 Montana.
- 23 20 Merritts is creeping ever
- 24 forward. He's gotten some progress. We
- 25 continue to take it on a day-by-day basis;

- 1 1-25-21
- 2 they do some work then they disappear for
- 3 three days; they do a little bit more;
- 4 they're gone for a week.
- 5 TRUSTEE ANTHONY ADDEO: I see that
- 6 that construction fence is down except for
- 7 around the foundation that's not built.
- 8 That indicates to me that they're not
- 9 going to build any of the lots on the
- 10 south side. Did you hear about that?
- 11 STEPHEN FELLMAN: We haven't heard
- 12 a word about that.
- 13 TRUSTEE ANTHONY ADDEO: Okay.
- 14 STEPHEN FELLMAN: Not a word. I
- 15 think they're taking the fencing down
- 16 because they're attempting to get C/O's
- 17 for the houses that are built. So they're
- 18 going to have to have access to the site.
- 19 They seem to be focusing on the two houses
- 20 that are in Oyster Bay, that we don't have
- 21 control over because they know they've got
- 22 quite a bit to do to make us happy in the
- 23 Village here. I'm assuming. I'm just
- 24 guessing. You know, I'm speculating that
- 25 they're trying to get those sold.

- 1 1-25-21
- 2 According to the developer, he claims he
- 3 has four or five of the houses sold. They
- 4 just have to close on them. I sent him an
- 5 email asking how they intend to handle the
- 6 fact that the homeowners have to have
- 7 control of maintaining retaining walls on
- 8 the property on the north property line.
- 9 I sent it out Friday. That email I have
- 10 not heard back yet.
- 11 TRUSTEE ANTHONY ADDEO: Still, on
- 12 that note, Steve, what is your opinion
- 13 about getting a covenant restriction
- 14 placed on those deeds to have all of the
- 15 owners presently enter into a maintenance
- 16 agreement and future owners enter into a
- 17 maintenance agreement for the wall.
- 18 STEPHEN FELLMAN: Obviously,
- 19 Anthony, you know a whole lot better than
- 20 me on how to do that. I think it has to
- 21 be on a per lot -- it's not going to be
- 22 homeowners association or anything. I
- 23 think it's an CNR per lot, for what's on
- 24 your property, I -- that makes sense to
- 25 me. Again, you would be a lot better at

- 1 1-25-21
- 2 this than me.
- 3 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: There's only
- 4 -- of the eight houses in the Village of
- 5 Farmingdale, I believe, Stevie, only three
- 6 have the retaining wall?
- 7 STEPHEN FELLMAN: That's correct.
- 8 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: So -- and
- 9 there is -- as far as we know, there won't
- 10 be a homeowner's association. So we
- 11 would have to do something for each
- 12 individual lot.
- 13 Claudio, could you chime in here.
- 14 How would we do it on each -- we
- 15 would do a covenant on each individual
- 16 lot?
- 17 TRUSTEE ANTHONY ADDEO: Not us but
- 18 the seller would have to put it in the
- 19 deed when they transfer the property and
- 20 not only that but before the closing could
- 21 happen, before we should issue a C/O, we
- 22 should see the property maintenance
- 23 agreement that's going to be recorded with
- 24 the deed so when a new owner buys the
- 25 property, they will know about the

- 1 1-25-21
- 2 maintenance agreement that they have to
- 3 sign on to.
- 4 CLAUDIO DE BELLIS, ESQ.: So,
- 5 Anthony, the C of O would be -- would have
- 6 language in it to that effect; correct?
- 7 TRUSTEE ANTHONY ADDEO: I'm sorry,
- 8 say it again?
- 9 CLAUDIO DE BELLIS, ESQ.: The C/O
- 10 would have language to that effect, making
- 11 that a requirement to the deed?
- 12 TRUSTEE ANTHONY ADDEO: Well, you
- 13 could put it in the C/O, but my opinion is
- 14 the proper procedure would be that the
- 15 developer file with each deed -- excuse me
- 16 -- with each deed, in the body of the
- 17 deed, there be language that says that
- 18 there is a covenant and restriction filed
- 19 along with this deed, and that the owner
- 20 of the premises must enter into -- excuse
- 21 me -- must become a party to the
- 22 maintenance agreement which is filed along
- 23 with this deed so not only this owner, but
- 24 future owners know what their
- 25 responsibility is and that it's that way

- 1 1-25-21
- 2 forever, going forward; that they file
- 3 with each deed a maintenance agreement and
- 4 the maintenance agreement be part of a
- 5 covenant and restriction, moving forward.
- 6 That's the way I've seen it done in the
- 7 past and I've done it as well.
- 8 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: So we have
- 9 our Building Department insist upon that
- 10 before a C/O is issued?
- 11 TRUSTEE ANTHONY ADDEO: Oh, sure.
- 12 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: Okay.
- 13 TRUSTEE ANTHONY ADDEO: We do none
- 14 of it. Their lawyer does it all.
- 15 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: Okay.
- 16 STEPHEN FELLMAN: Right, they prove
- 17 to us they filed for the CNR before we
- 18 would issue the C/O. The C/O is our
- 19 leverage, you know. And I don't want to
- 20 give up that leverage.
- 21 The other thing is, I'm not sure --
- 22 you got two properties that have the
- 23 biggest parts of these walls in Nassau
- 24 County. I mean, I will share this
- 25 information with Nassau County, but --

- 1 1-25-21
- 2 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: Town of
- 3 Oyster Bay.
- 4 STEPHEN FELLMAN: Town of Oyster
- 5 Bay. But if they don't put it on their
- 6 two parcels, that'll be trouble for them
- 7 in the future, not for the Village.
- 8 Also don't rule out the south side.
- 9 There's going to be some kind of retaining
- 10 wall not -- nothing like the one on the
- 11 north side, but there may be a one to two
- 12 foot retaining wall system on the south
- 13 side, they'll be able to create the
- 14 ability to backgrade that gully system to
- 15 pick up the rainwater, to make sure it
- 16 doesn't go into the backyards of people on
- 17 Hampshire (phonetic). So...
- 18 TRUSTEE ANTHONY ADDEO: Can I make
- 19 another suggestion, please?
- 20 STEPHEN FELLMAN: Sure.
- 21 TRUSTEE ANTHONY ADDEO: That before
- 22 we issue any C/O's, that retaining wall on
- 23 the south side be issued -- be completed
- 24 because if they sell these few houses and
- 25 they walk away, that retaining wall will

- 1 1-25-21
- 2 never be completed or not be completed
- 3 two, three, four, years down the line.
- 4 STEPHEN FELLMAN: We can't really
- 5 do that now, Anthony, because we have no
- 6 idea what the grading is going to be when
- 7 they build those houses, if they haven't
- 8 built them -- the houses itselves (sic)
- 9 are walkouts in the back the house becomes
- 10 most of the retaining wall when you won't
- 11 know the exact grading or the extent of
- 12 all that's needed until we get to that.
- 13 We'll have control over those C/O's so
- 14 we'll have all the leverage in the world.
- 15 TRUSTEE ANTHONY ADDEO: Can't we --
- 16 so let's assume the following. Let's
- 17 assume they provide us with the
- 18 engineering, we can then have them build
- 19 the wall for the walkout, because my fear
- 20 is that they abandon the project, and that
- 21 retaining wall to the south never gets
- 22 built or doesn't get built 'til three,
- 23 four, five six years when the next
- 24 developer comes around and wants to put
- 25 homes on that site. If any developer ever

- 1 1-25-21
- 2 comes around. That's my fear.
- 3 Like you said, Steve, the C/O's for
- 4 the homes that are built is our leverage.
- 5 Make them perform. That's just my
- 6 opinion.
- 7 STEPHEN FELLMAN: Yeah, I just
- 8 think is it -- is it much unknown on the
- 9 south side, we still have the leverage of
- 10 all the control on that side. I think
- 11 it's in our best interest to get this
- 12 developer to complete things on the north
- 13 side correctly, with the retaining system.
- 14 We still have guardrails that have to go
- in, we have estate fencing. I just think
- 16 -- you know, it's a little piece of the
- 17 time, let's get the north side correct.
- 18 Let's get Oyster Bay involved to make them
- 19 at least aware that -- worry about who's
- 20 taking control of their retaining walls in
- 21 the future.
- The south has not been a problem
- 23 since we corrected all the grading and the
- 24 drainage over there. I keep checking in
- 25 over there and everything seems to be okay

- 1 1-25-21
- 2 so far. They have maintained it. They
- 3 actually mowed down all the weeds. I
- 4 think now they have to because they're
- 5 selling the homes on the north side --
- 6 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: Yeah, they
- 7 want it to look good.
- 8 STEPHEN FELLMAN: (Continuing) They
- 9 want it to look good. So it's in their
- 10 best interest.
- 11 TRUSTEE ANTHONY ADDEO: Have they
- 12 sent the documentation to dedicate the
- 13 road yet?
- 14 STEPHEN FELLMAN: I've seen
- 15 nothing.
- 16 TRUSTEE ANTHONY ADDEO: So we can't
- 17 issue a C/O until the road is dedicated.
- 18 STEPHEN FELLMAN: We're not -- we
- 19 got a ways to go for a C/O. I'm worried
- 20 about them spinning of to two Oyster Bay
- 21 parks.
- 22 DEPUTY MAYOR WILLIAM BARRETT: Go
- 23 into that, Stevie. I mean, they're not
- 24 putting up the same wall or --
- 25 STEPHEN FELLMAN: No, they put the

- 1 1-25-21
- 2 wall up. They -- the beach walls on those
- 3 two lots, I'm very impressed that they
- 4 made them -- they followed what we were
- 5 doing -- made them put the two tier all
- 6 the way down to the west on that side.
- 7 They have --
- 8 DEPUTY MAYOR WILLIAM BARRETT: I
- 9 can't think of the person's name right
- 10 now, but his property is protected.
- 11 STEPHEN FELLMAN: Alex (phonetic).
- 12 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: Alex
- 13 (phonetic).
- 14 DEPUTY MAYOR WILLIAM BARRETT: Alex
- 15 (phonetic), yes.
- 16 STEPHEN FELLMAN: Oh, no, we're
- 17 working -- you know, constant contact -- I
- 18 think that part of his property is in
- 19 great shape. We gotta make sure they
- 20 extend the second tier as far east as they
- 21 can. That was part of the H2M report. I
- 22 put them in contact with the -- a site guy
- 23 from (inaudible) -- we're going to try to
- 24 grade and -- take a section and get it
- 25 graded and make sure everybody is happy.

- 1 1-25-21
- 2 One of their concerns was -- they
- 3 were afraid to be able to fill and kinda
- 4 fill back to Alex's (phonetic) property.
- 5 They thought, you know -- they crossed
- 6 over his property line, he would shoot
- 7 them. You know, Alex (phonetic) was
- 8 absolutely the opposite. Alex (phonetic)
- 9 said I'll cooperate in any way I can. You
- 10 can grade back on my property. You know,
- 11 let's just get it right. He's been very
- 12 cooperative with that.
- 13 So we're going to get a section
- 14 done, make sure everybody agrees, likes
- 15 the way it looks. We do have to extend
- 16 that second tier east, probably a good 20
- 17 feet or so. We'll measure it, but they're
- 18 getting close to getting it right over
- 19 there.
- 20 TRUSTEE ANTHONY ADDEO: Do we want
- 21 to have Claudio get in touch with Tim Zike
- 22 who is the Deputy Commissioner at the Town
- 23 of Oyster Bay Planning and Developing and
- 24 discuss CNR's and covenants in the deeds
- 25 for the homes that are in Oyster Bay so

- 1 1-25-21
- 2 they match ours, so the wall on Oyster
- 3 Bay, in 20 years from now, doesn't fall
- 4 into disrepair?
- 5 STEPHEN FELLMAN: That's why I
- 6 raised the question. I knew I'd get a
- 7 great answer from the Board.
- 8 DEPUTY MAYOR WILLIAM BARRETT:
- 9 Yeah, I think that has to be done.
- 10 TRUSTEE ANTHONY ADDEO: Yeah.
- 11 CLAUDIO DE BELLIS, ESQ.: So here's
- 12 a question. Does this developer -- does
- 13 he know that this is coming? That he's
- 14 required to have a CNR?
- 15 STEPHEN FELLMAN: Yes, I --
- 16 CLAUDIO DE BELLIS, ESQ.: Okay,
- 17 good.
- 18 STEPHEN FELLMAN: He knew -- I
- 19 said, as of Friday -- we talked about it
- 20 often -- I sent him an email on Friday and
- 21 said how do you want to handle this, that
- 22 each homeowner -- because I know he's not
- 23 a homeowner's association.
- 24 CLAUDIO DE BELLIS, ESQ.: Right.
- 25 STEPHEN FELLMAN: So I said, how do

- 1 1-25-21
- 2 you want to handle that? How do you want
- 3 to do that in the contract of sale? So
- 4 they realize they're responsible for
- 5 maintaining that wall. I have not heard
- 6 back. But it's only Monday.
- 7 CLAUDIO DE BELLIS, ESQ.: Okay.
- 8 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: What that
- 9 means is, Claudio, that, like many
- 10 developers, "What do you mean? I don't
- 11 remember you telling me that."
- 12 DEPUTY MAYOR WILLIAM BARRETT:
- 13 Yeah, and to the point, you know, I spoke
- 14 to -- the lawyer called me up -- I'm going
- 15 to say it was probably a year ago, when
- 16 this was nowhere near where it is now --
- and he said to me, "Hey, can we get the
- 18 road dedicated?" I said, you haven't even
- 19 put up a (inaudible). You're nowhere near
- 20 having a -- you want a what? So that was
- 21 the last time I heard of him. And he
- 22 goes, "No, that's not what my client told
- 23 me. I'm sorry. Yeah, we'll circle back."
- 24 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: So we're --
- 25 TRUSTEE ANTHONY ADDEO: My idea is

- 1 1-25-21
- 2 that the governmental authorities, the
- 3 Village and the Town, get on the same page
- 4 and approach the developer's attorney and
- 5 tell you this is what we want. If you
- 6 want a C/O, give us this. That's my
- 7 opinion.
- 8 DEPUTY MAYOR WILLIAM BARRETT: Okay.
- 9 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: It would
- 10 make sense for the Town of Oyster Bay to
- 11 have the same -- same deal as the Village
- 12 of Farmingdale. You know.
- 13 CLAUDIO DE BELLIS, ESQ.: Yeah.
- 14 Who was the attorney -- you know, you
- 15 mentioned that name there, Anthony. Do
- 16 you have that contact info that you can
- 17 pass on to me and I'll give him back that
- 18 call?
- 19 TRUSTEE ANTHONY ADDEO: Yeah, I'll
- 20 get it to you tomorrow.
- 21 CLAUDIO DE BELLIS, ESQ.: Great.
- 22 TRUSTEE ANTHONY ADDEO: No problem.
- 23 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: Okay. All
- 24 right, Stevie, have we heard anything with
- 25 the towing guy?

- 1 1-25-21
- 2 STEPHEN FELLMAN: Nothing.
- 3 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: On --
- 4 STEPHEN FELLMAN: All is quiet.
- 5 He's busy towing I think.
- 6 TRUSTEE WALTER PRIESTLEY: The
- 7 place looks a little more cleaned up. It
- 8 looks like some of the dirt was -- has
- 9 been removed.
- 10 STEPHEN FELLMAN: And, in fairness,
- 11 the stuff they're doing, it's just too
- 12 cold. They can't do --
- 13 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: Right, but
- 14 in the meantime ---
- 15 STEPHEN FELLMAN: (Continuing) --
- 16 a whole lot right now.
- 17 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI:
- 18 (Continuing) -- shouldn't he have put in
- 19 an application about his eight foot wall?
- 20 STEPHEN FELLMAN: Absolutely.
- 21 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: We better
- 22 harass him.
- 23 STEPHEN FELLMAN: I spoke to his
- 24 attorney, I spoke to him, I spoke to guys
- 25 at the site.

- 1 1-25-21
- 2 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI:
- 3 Unbelievable.
- 4 STEPHEN FELLMAN: It's -- again, I
- 5 -- I think like all things -- all people
- 6 may be mulling whether or not to just cut
- 7 it down back to six foot or leave it, you
- 8 know -- he's kinda like at six and-a-half
- 9 feet now. They may be mulling over,
- 10 financially, what to do, and I think it's
- 11 just that time of year. It's frozen. You
- 12 can't do anymore masonry. You can't do
- 13 that site. You can't do the asphalt. And
- 14 I'm sure he's just trying to, you know,
- 15 tow cars and make some money to be able to
- 16 pay for all this. So I think it's just a
- 17 little -- a little respite at the moment
- 18 until things improve, but I can reach out
- 19 again and kinda see what they're thinking.
- 20 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: Yeah, let's
- 21 -- maybe we could just get like a little
- 22 timeline considering it's so cold, et
- 23 cetera, what his thoughts are.
- 24 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: Yeah.
- 25 That's a -- a timeline, you know -- you

- 1 1-25-21
- 2 know how to work your magic, Stevie. Just
- 3 tell him, look the Board is looking for a
- 4 timeline. We know you can't do any
- 5 masonry this time of year and --
- 6 STEPHEN FELLMAN: Well the first
- 7 thing was when I was -- do you intend to
- 8 go for the variance or not go for the
- 9 variance?
- 10 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: Yeah.
- 11 STEPHEN FELLMAN: That and --
- 12 again, I had called and spoken to his
- 13 attorney, personally, around
- 14 Christmastime -- before Christmas -- about
- 15 it and he said, okay, he'd get right on
- 16 it, and then the holidays struck. I'll
- 17 get back on it.
- 18 DEPUTY MAYOR WILLIAM BARRETT: Do
- 19 we have to issue a summons or something
- 20 like that? Since it's illegal as it is.
- 21 STEPHEN FELLMAN: Well, they
- 22 haven't asked for a -- they haven't said
- 23 they want to take it down and --
- 24 DEPUTY MAYOR WILLIAM BARRETT: But
- 25 it shouldn't be there in the first place.

- 1 1-25-21
- 2 TRUSTEE WALTER PRIESTLEY: Right
- 3 now it's only six and-a-half feet;
- 4 correct?
- 5 STEPHEN FELLMAN: Yeah. They're at
- 6 six and-a-half -- they got one more block
- 7 to go if they want to go up more.
- 8 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: Right now
- 9 they're only a half a foot over.
- 10 STEPHEN FELLMAN: Yeah, I --
- 11 they're not -- they're not fighting with
- 12 us, they're just mulling it -- mulling it
- over. And, apparently, there's an issue
- 14 -- they explained to me -- I'll try to get
- 15 to the bottom of that, too -- but there's
- 16 an insurance problem in terms of some of
- 17 these cars -- again, they're pulling them
- 18 off the parkway -- some of these cars
- 19 maybe they can't -- they're missing
- 20 insurance, they're missing inspections,
- 21 they're stolen. You know, they have
- 22 people that want to break into the yard
- 23 and steal their cars back. I used to know
- 24 George Benedict (phonetically) -- if you
- 25 remember Benedict's Towing (phonetically),

- 1 1-25-21
- 2 used to be where Surface Man is -- now, I
- 3 actually knew George very, very well, and
- 4 these are crazy people that come in and
- 5 will grab their car in the middle of the
- 6 night and drive right through the fence
- 7 and -- and make off at a hundred miles an
- 8 hour -- some of them -- most of them are
- 9 legit. You know, they come in, they had a
- 10 real accident, want to get fixed up. But
- 11 ten percent of them are escaped, crazy
- 12 people.
- 13 TRUSTEE WALTER PRIESTLEY: Or a --
- 14 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: Oh, nice.
- 15 TRUSTEE WALTER PRIESTLEY:
- 16 (Continuing) -- repo of the cars.
- 17 STEPHEN FELLMAN: Yeah.
- 18 TRUSTEE WALTER PRIESTLEY: They're
- 19 repossessed cars and --
- 20 STEPHEN FELLMAN: Yeah.
- 21 TRUSTEE WALTER PRIESTLEY:
- 22 (Continuing) -- I just heard a story of a
- 23 guy who -- the car was up on the -- on the
- 24 tow truck and the guy jumped in his own
- 25 car and drove it off the tow truck when it

- 1 1-25-21
- 2 was like two, two and-a-half feet off the
- 3 ground.
- 4 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: Oh, my God.
- 5 TRUSTEE WALTER PRIESTLEY: And
- 6 drove off.
- 7 STEPHEN FELLMAN: Yeah.
- 8 TRUSTEE WALTER PRIESTLEY: So
- 9 they're just, you know, insane.
- 10 STEPHEN FELLMAN: He has the towing
- 11 contract and what happens is, if the car
- 12 is disabled, they just call me and tow his
- 13 car. He has no idea whose car he's
- 14 towing. Think about it. It could have
- 15 been the bank robber. He towed a car to
- 16 bring it in -- and, again, 99 percent of
- 17 the time it's no big deal and he loves it
- 18 because he gets auto body work for the --
- 19 a crashed car or whatever -- but every
- 20 once in awhile you got one of those
- 21 people.
- 22 TRUSTEE WALTER PRIESTLEY: Well.
- 23 either way, he's got to file for a
- 24 variance, so...
- 25 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: Yeah.

- 1 1-25-21
- 2 TRUSTEE WALTER PRIESTLEY: Just
- 3 tell him let's get moving on it so he
- 4 doesn't leave us hanging.
- 5 DEPUTY MAYOR WILLIAM BARRETT:
- 6 Stevie, anything going on with the tanning
- 7 salon?
- 8 STEPHEN FELLMAN: Nothing.
- 9 DEPUTY MAYOR WILLIAM BARRETT:
- 10 Nothing at all?
- 11 STEPHEN FELLMAN: No, and I don't
- 12 blame any of these people because I'm sure
- 13 they all have contracts that said they
- 14 start paying rent as of a C/O so they have
- 15 no -- no reason to want to get a C/O.
- 16 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: Yeah, that's
- 17 the nail on the head with the restaurant.
- 18 BRIAN HARTY: I think they start
- 19 paying rent before that, Steve, in all
- 20 honesty, but I just don't think they're
- 21 looking to move ahead, and too many have
- 22 clarity on the pandemic. They may end up
- 23 walking away. That's my opinion.
- 24 TRUSTEE WALTER PRIESTLEY: I've
- 25 heard that the people across from Hallett

- 1 1-25-21
- 2 (phonetic) they're paying rent every month
- 3 to the Spanish family --
- 4 BRIAN HARTY: A lot of landlords
- 5 it's going to sit there ---
- 6 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: Yeah,
- 7 because six weeks ago there were people
- 8 actually doing work across from Hallett
- 9 (phonetic) on that one particular -- on
- 10 Barton's Liquor Store. You know the old
- 11 -- but --
- 12 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: Have
- 13 plans -- that did anything. I'm sorry,
- 14 Cheryl.
- 15 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: No, that's
- 16 okay. But they were only there one day.
- 17 STEPHEN FELLMAN: Right.
- 18 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: And I have
- 19 not seen anything since.
- 20 BRIAN HARTY: They may have stopped
- 21 paying rent. That's why they stopped
- 22 working. You know --
- 23 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: Could be,
- 24 Brian. I mean because we've seen no work
- 25 anyplace, not at the Gluten Free Brewery,

- 1 1-25-21
- 2 not at Grandma's Kitchen, and not across
- 3 from --
- 4 STEPHEN FELLMAN: But Steve Sharkie
- 5 is checking them, you know, every couple
- 6 of days to see if anything is going on --
- 7 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: Right.
- 8 STEPHEN FELLMAN: (Continuing) --
- 9 there's nothing going on.
- 10 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: What about
- 11 the --
- 12 BRIAN HARTY: Next week get some
- 13 contact with them, Steve.
- 14 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: And is the
- 15 restaurant --
- 16 BRIAN HARTY: (Continuing)
- 17 (inaudible)
- 18 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI:
- 19 (Continuing) -- the restaurant next to the
- 20 Gluten Free Brewery, are they still
- 21 waiting for a gas line?
- 22 DEPUTY MAYOR WILLIAM BARRETT:
- 23 Yeah, that's (inaudible) talking about.
- 24 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: Oh, okay.
- 25 I'm sorry.

- 1 1-25-21
- 2 DEPUTY MAYOR WILLIAM BARRETT:
- 3 Yeah, the tanning salon. You know.
- 4 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: See I call
- 5 that the -- that was the tanning salon?
- 6 Oh, yeah, the brewery is the old
- 7 (inaudible) furniture store. You're
- 8 right. Sorry.
- 9 (WHEREUPON, there was inaudible
- 10 cross-talk among the parties present.)
- 11 BRIAN HARTY: They were going to
- 12 come through the back with that.
- 13 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: Uh-huh.
- 14 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: Yeah, there
- 15 was a problem with the gas line.
- I know the person -- I'll know by
- 17 the end of the week when -- I see them at
- 18 the -- at a certain place -- certain
- 19 restaurant in town, I see them at. I'll
- 20 -- I see one of their contractors. I'll
- 21 find out.
- 22 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: Okay.
- 23 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: Anything
- 24 else for Stevie?
- 25 (WHEREUPON, no response was heard.)

- 1 1-25-21
- 2 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: Just so you
- 3 know, Stevie, you can call up Robbie,
- 4 he'll give you a story. He came back from
- 5 Montana over the weekend. So he's here.
- 6 STEPHEN FELLMAN: Can't wait.
- 7 TRUSTEE WALTER PRIESTLEY: Steve, I
- 8 know he says he's having trouble getting
- 9 steel, but, you know what, anybody in the
- 10 construction trades right now -- I'm
- 11 having trouble getting a door for my
- 12 office, I'm having trouble getting an
- 13 adjusting table.
- 14 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: Yup.
- 15 TRUSTEE WALTER PRIESTLEY:
- 16 Everything is backed up. Every --
- 17 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: I can't get
- 18 a garage door -- yeah.
- 19 TRUSTEE WALTER PRIESTLEY:
- 20 (Continuing) -- thing takes three months.
- 21 Because the factories are all down.
- 22 Fencing, you can't get fencing. Canada is
- 23 not producing any lumber right now. So,
- 24 it's probably a real issue that --
- 25 STEPHEN FELLMAN: Two by four's --

- 1 1-25-21
- 2 TRUSTEE WALTER PRIESTLEY:
- 3 (Continuing) -- that he's facing.
- 4 STEPHEN FELLMAN: Two by four's are
- 5 almost eight dollars a piece right now.
- 6 Which is --
- 7 BRIAN HARTY: Are they really?
- 8 STEPHEN FELLMAN: Yeah.
- 9 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: Yeah.
- 10 STEPHEN FELLMAN: Because they're
- 11 not milling anything, and it comes from
- 12 Canada and there's all kinds of problems
- 13 -- like I went into Lowe's, a sheet of
- 14 plywood is \$50.
- 15 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: You know
- 16 what --
- 17 STEPHEN FELLMAN: What?
- 18 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI:
- 19 (Continuing) -- I bought -- I bought one
- 20 -- I bought one piece of pine today, one
- 21 inch by six -- one by six, ten feet long,
- 22 \$26.
- 23 STEPHEN FELLMAN: That's crazy.
- 24 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: For pine?
- 25 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: Yeah, pine.

- 1 1-25-21
- 2 Twenty -- crazy.
- 3 STEPHEN FELLMAN: It's insane.
- 4 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: Uh-hum.
- 5 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: But could
- 6 you get a machete?
- 7 STEPHEN FELLMAN: Sorry, I couldn't
- 8 get the machete. I had to buy a different
- 9 cutting tool. It worked out better
- 10 actually.
- 11 TRUSTEE WALTER PRIESTLEY: I
- 12 ordered a window from Windowrama. They
- 13 told me three months.
- 14 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: Yeah,
- 15 right. We got a garage door coming from
- 16 Costco. It's already eight weeks waiting.
- 17 TRUSTEE WALTER PRIESTLEY: And they
- 18 tell you three months and then it turns
- 19 out it's four months or five months.
- 20 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: Yup.
- 21 STEPHEN FELLMAN: They've all
- 22 become -- the only group like that, that
- 23 I've known my whole life is surveyors.
- 24 It's the only group of people --
- 25 TRUSTEE WALTER PRIESTLEY: That can

- 1 1-25-21
- 2 get away with that.
- 3 STEPHEN FELLMAN: (Continuing) --
- 4 that they tell you two to three weeks and
- 5 it's like six months. Some of them never
- 6 even comes close to the timeline, and I'm
- 7 talking in 30 years, none of them come
- 8 close. I don't know what it is.
- 9 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: It's
- 10 unbelievable.
- 11 STEPHEN FELLMAN: Yeah. But, yeah,
- 12 it's very strange right now. I'm not
- 13 going to guess what the problem is, but he
- 14 claims that they stole his \$50,000 deposit
- 15 and he's switching companies. He's going
- 16 to another steel company and they're going
- 17 to reorder the steel --
- 18 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: He did. He
- 19 reordered the streel from another steel
- 20 company --
- 21 STEPHEN FELLMAN: Okay.
- 22 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: (Continuing)
- 23 -- and he told me he lost forty grand.
- 24 STEPHEN FELLMAN: Well, he went
- 25 down --

- 1 1-25-21
- 2 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: Wow.
- 3 STEPHEN FELLMAN: (Continuing) --
- 4 he said -- it was fifty grand --
- 5 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: Wow.
- 6 STEPHEN FELLMAN: (Continuing) --
- 7 to me, so... He's doing better.
- 8 TRUSTEE WALTER PRIESTLEY: They may
- 9 have the same problem with the other steel
- 10 company. Let's hope he doesn't.
- 11 STEPHEN FELLMAN: Yeah.
- 12 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: Okay.
- 13 Highway Department.
- 14 BRIAN HARTY: Highway Department:
- 15 They worked on -- they got that -- the
- 16 street light up Moby (phonetic) Way --
- 17 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: Yes.
- 18 BRIAN HARTY: (Continuing) --
- 19 Friday and they've been -- some other
- 20 lighting work around the Village.
- 21 They're prepping for the storms for
- 22 tomorrow. We just really don't know what
- 23 it's going to be, an inch to three inches
- 24 or so, but they're ready for it.
- 25 And there's a tech station that

- 1 1-25-21
- 2 we're going to be putting down by -- on
- 3 Eastern Parkway. We ordered that. It
- 4 just came in. Other than that it's
- 5 (inaudible) and so on.
- 6 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: It's the
- 7 Thursday snowstorm I'm worried about.
- 8 That's -- that's gonna be right now --
- 9 depends on who you listen to -- it's
- 10 anywhere from four to eight inches.
- 11 (WHEREUPON, there was
- 12 indecipherable cross-talk among the
- 13 parties.)
- 14 BRIAN HARTY: They got -- they got
- 15 -- they're loaded up. They got nine plows
- 16 ready and seven sanders ready. So they're
- 17 all ready for what's coming this week I
- 18 should say.
- 19 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: And we got
- 20 lots of salt.
- 21 BRIAN HARTY: Lots of salts.
- 22 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: I actually
- 23 -- you know I thought of you two this week
- 24 when I signed the check. I signed the
- 25 check to Atlantic Salt (phonetic) --

- 1 1-25-21
- 2 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: Yes.
- 3 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: (Continuing)
- 4 -- and I'm saying to myself, somebody's
- 5 going to ask me about what did we need
- 6 another 45 tons of salt for --
- 7 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: Correct.
- 8 Correct.
- 9 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: (Continuing)
- 10 -- and I -- but I asked. We want to keep
- 11 it at a certain level throughout the year
- 12 so if we -- if we throw out 45 tons so far
- 13 this year, we'll buy another 45 tons so we
- 14 have it --
- 15 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: Yup.
- 16 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: (Continuing)
- 17 -- because we don't want to get caught
- 18 short like we did 12 years ago when all of
- 19 a sudden there was no salt and we couldn't
- 20 get any more.
- 21 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: Don't we
- 22 have to buy it --
- 23 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: Remember
- 24 that?
- 25 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: Yes. And

- 1 1-25-21
- 2 are we -- Brian, maybe -- Barbara,
- 3 definitely would know -- but maybe you
- 4 know, Brian -- we don't -- aren't we
- 5 committed to buying a certain amount?
- 6 BRIAN HARTY: We're obligated to
- 7 buy a certain amount. I don't --
- 8 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: That's what
- 9 I thought.
- 10 BRIAN HARTY: (Continuing) -- know
- 11 what the certain amount is --
- 12 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: Yeah, I
- 13 forget what the amount is to get --
- 14 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: Yeah, me,
- 15 too.
- 16 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: (Continuing)
- 17 -- to get the state bid contracted price,
- 18 we have to buy "X" amount of tons --
- 19 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: Yeah.
- 20 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: (Continuing)
- 21 -- throughout the period. That's --
- 22 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: And it's a
- 23 lot of --
- 24 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: (Continuing)
- 25 -- a hundred percent --

- 1 1-25-21
- 2 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI:
- 3 (Continuing) -- salt. It really is. It's
- 4 a lot of salt.
- 5 DEPUTY MAYOR WILLIAM BARRETT:
- 6 Yeah, but I think we have a lot of salt
- 7 left over from last year.
- 8 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: We do, huh?
- 9 BRIAN HARTY: You get a couple of
- 10 storms, you use it pretty quick.
- 11 DEPUTY MAYOR WILLIAM BARRETT: In
- 12 fact -- yeah, well... I don't know. I
- 13 haven't had -- (inaudible) the driving
- 14 range over there, so I -- I -- but when I
- 15 looked in, I expected it to be at the very
- 16 top -- the salt. It wasn't. It wasn't.
- 17 And that was in the late summer, early
- 18 fall. I think someone's stealing it.
- 19 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: It's all
- 20 right.
- 21 DEPUTY MAYOR WILLIAM BARRETT: I'm
- 22 teasing on that part.
- 23 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: Nobody's --
- 24 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: I know.
- 25 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: Yeah.

- 1 1-25-21
- MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: I know,
- 3 Bill. After all, we all consider you the
- 4 salt of the earth.
- 5 DEPUTY MAYOR WILLIAM BARRETT: Oh,
- 6 yeah. Let's move on. Let's move on.
- 7 STEPHEN FELLMAN: I was going to go
- 8 with salty dog, myself.
- 9 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: Anyway --
- 10 BRIAN HARTY: Water Department:
- 11 The bids on the tank are out. They're due
- 12 back on the 17th of February. So then
- 13 we'll know.
- 14 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: Okay,
- 15 good.
- 16 BRIAN HARTY: That's on Water.
- 17 Code Department, we're still
- 18 working on a limited schedule on Code.
- 19 And the -- I do believe that Diane had
- 20 completed what was -- what she was tasked
- 21 with completing as far as badges are
- 22 concerned. I think they're done.
- 23 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: Good.
- 24 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: All right.
- 25 BRIAN HARTY: Okay. And that's all

- 1 1-25-21
- 2 I've got for the moment.
- 3 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: And just to
- 4 let you know, Ralph, and Brian, I
- 5 forwarded to you the paper work from
- 6 Nassau County that needs to get signed in
- 7 case you couldn't find your original
- 8 emails.
- 9 BRIAN HARTY: Thank you, Cheryl.
- 10 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: I still have
- 11 it, Cheryl. I --
- 12 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: Okay.
- 13 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: (Continuing)
- 14 -- you know what, I think it's one of
- 15 those things that Brian thought I signed
- 16 it and I thought Brian signed it and we'll
- 17 fix it.
- 18 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: Okay.
- 19 BRIAN HARTY: We'll make sure it
- 20 gets done tomorrow.
- 21 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: Good.
- 22 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: Yeah.
- 23 That'll be -- that'll be the first thing
- 24 tomorrow morning.
- 25 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: Okay.

- 1 1-25-21
- 2 BRIAN HARTY: Absolutely.
- 3 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: Anybody --
- 4 Walter, Anthony, Bill, Cheryl, anything
- 5 before we move on to Exec?
- 6 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: No.
- 7 TRUSTEE ANTHONY ADDEO: Just one
- 8 thing I noticed is behind Palmer's
- 9 American Grille, there's a fence there
- 10 that's been broken up for a couple of
- 11 months. I know they can't get fencing
- 12 now, but it's pretty much destroyed. I
- don't know if it's a requirement that it
- 14 be railroad or the property owner, but
- 15 it's in bad shape.
- 16 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: Is it the --
- 17 is it the -- is it -- does it look like
- 18 that it's the fence that's preventing
- 19 stray animals and kids from straying onto
- 20 the tracks?
- 21 TRUSTEE ANTHONY ADDEO: Yeah.
- 22 BRIAN HARTY: If you're talking
- 23 about -- I'm thinking about the same
- 24 thing, it's a plastic -- plastic fence
- 25 that's got a lot of pieces out.

- 1 1-25-21
- 2 DEPUTY MAYOR WILLIAM BARRETT:
- 3 Yeah, I've seen that.
- 4 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: Yes.
- 5 BRIAN HARTY: Yeah, I don't think
- 6 that's what you're talking about, Ralph.
- 7 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: Oh, okay.
- 8 No, I was trying to determine if it was on
- 9 the railroad right-of-way or not.
- 10 BRIAN HARTY: We have to determine
- 11 who the property owner there --
- 12 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: Yeah,
- 13 right.
- 14 BRIAN HARTY: (Continuing) --
- 15 (inaudible) or if it's the railroad. So
- 16 we got to figure that out.
- 17 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: Well, that's
- 18 okay --
- 19 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: I would --
- 20 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: (Continuing)
- 21 -- we can --
- 22 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: Palmer's --
- 23 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: (Continuing)
- 24 -- well, why don't we --
- 25 BRIAN HARTY: (Inaudible) We just

- 1 1-25-21
- 2 gotta be sure.
- 3 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: Why don't we
- 4 pull the building file and see who we gave
- 5 the fence permit to.
- 6 BRIAN HARTY: Sure. We can do
- 7 that.
- 8 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: That would
- 9 make everybody's life easier -- who we
- 10 issued the fence permit to and we'll make
- 11 that party responsible when -- when they
- 12 can get the parts to -- to fix the fence.
- 13 We all understand that's -- it's tough to
- 14 get parts for anything right now, but
- 15 we'll give them a notice that they're
- 16 going to have to get this fixed.
- 17 Okay. Got it there, Stevie?
- 18 STEPHEN FELLMAN: I got it.
- 19 DEPUTY MAYOR WILLIAM BARRETT:
- 20 Mayor, did we talk about the lease for the
- 21 Chief's car? Is that --
- 22 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: Oh, yeah,
- 23 I'm sorry, Bill. We talked about it --
- DEPUTY MAYOR WILLIAM BARRETT: Okay.
- 25 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: (Continuing)

- 1 1-25-21
- 2 -- just before you got -- everybody said
- 3 it was fine.
- 4 DEPUTY MAYOR WILLIAM BARRETT: Okay.
- 5 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: And I just
- 6 reminded everybody that that doesn't
- 7 include the -- can't include the lights
- 8 and siren which are put on by an outside
- 9 vendor, not --
- 10 DEPUTY MAYOR WILLIAM BARRETT:
- 11 Right.
- 12 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: (Continuing)
- 13 -- not Ford, themselves. The deal we made
- 14 put Ford, itself -- that they're not going
- 15 to allow us to add the lease of the sirens
- 16 and --
- 17 DEPUTY MAYOR WILLIAM BARRETT:
- 18 Right.
- 19 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: (Continuing)
- 20 -- mobile radios, et cetera.
- 21 DEPUTY MAYOR WILLIAM BARRETT:
- 22 That'll be paid as it's done. Yup.
- 23 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: Yeah. We
- 24 all agreed to it.
- DEPUTY MAYOR WILLIAM BARRETT: Okay.

- 1 1-25-21
- 2 TRUSTEE WALTER PRIESTLEY: And as
- 3 long as we're on the Fire Department, is
- 4 there any sort of installation dinner or
- 5 anything -- how are they going to do their
- 6 installation this year? Just by Zoom
- 7 or --
- 8 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: Well they
- 9 did it in Jan -- in April; no? Last
- 10 April?
- 11 TRUSTEE WALTER PRIESTLEY: Oh, I
- 12 thought --
- 13 DEPUTY MAYOR WILLIAM BARRETT: Yeah.
- 14 TRUSTEE WALTER PRIESTLEY:
- 15 (Continuing) -- they have a party this
- 16 time of year.
- 17 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: In
- 18 November, but that was passed over.
- 19 BRIAN HARTY: It was postponed
- 20 until May 6th.
- 21 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: Yes, the --
- 22 the November party was -- yeah, we --
- 23 Chief was good with it.
- 24 TRUSTEE WALTER PRIESTLEY: All
- 25 right.

- 1 1-25-21
- 2 DEPUTY MAYOR WILLIAM BARRETT:
- 3 Allocated that to defibrillators.
- 4 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: Yes.
- 5 TRUSTEE WALTER PRIESTLEY: Save
- 6 some money.
- 7 STEPHEN FELLMAN: That's like those
- 8 commercials, it's sounds from the old
- 9 world. You know, oh, installation dinner,
- 10 everybody come.
- 11 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: Right.
- 12 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: By the way,
- 13 just -- if everybody could remind us when
- 14 -- when we can meet in Village Hall again,
- 15 the Fire Department was going to give a
- 16 showing on, us and the staff, of how to
- 17 use the defibrillator --
- 18 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: Yeah, yes,
- 19 okay.
- 20 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: (Continuing)
- 21 -- that we have at Village Hall. It's
- 22 nice for it to be there and it is required
- 23 by law, but I'd like to get a little crash
- 24 course in knowing how to use it.
- 25 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: Sure. You

- 1 1-25-21
- 2 know, it's interesting that we don't --
- 3 have you ever been -- I have never been in
- 4 Massapequa Park's Village Hall. How much
- 5 bigger is it than ours?
- 6 TRUSTEE ANTHONY ADDEO: Big.
- 7 DEPUTY MAYOR WILLIAM BARRETT: Big.
- 8 TRUSTEE ANTHONY ADDEO: Much
- 9 bigger.
- 10 DEPUTY MAYOR WILLIAM BARRETT: It's
- 11 bigger.
- 12 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: Much
- 13 bigger?
- 14 TRUSTEE ANTHONY ADDEO: Twice the
- 15 size, at least. Three times --
- 16 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: Okay.
- 17 Because --
- 18 DEPUTY MAYOR WILLIAM BARRETT: I
- 19 would say even three times.
- 20 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: Okay. Just
- 21 curious because they've had meetings.
- 22 They've been -- had meetings since like
- 23 June. But that's quite much bigger than
- 24 ours, so...
- 25 TRUSTEE WALTER PRIESTLEY: Probably

- 1 1-25-21
- 2 not as nice.
- By the way, Brian, how's my
- 4 thermometer working out?
- 5 BRIAN HARTY: Oh, it's great.
- 6 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: I was in
- 7 there doing some paper work on Sunday and
- 8 I --
- 9 TRUSTEE WALTER PRIESTLEY: Put your
- 10 head in there.
- 11 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: I just -- I
- 12 have it -- I went over to it and it went
- 13 beep.
- 14 TRUSTEE WALTER PRIESTLEY: All
- 15 right, cool.
- 16 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: It works. I
- 17 like it. I think it's great.
- 18 BRIAN HARTY: Walter, where can we
- 19 get another one of those? We need one for
- 20 DPW.
- 21 TRUSTEE WALTER PRIESTLEY: Online.
- 22 They're \$70.
- 23 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: Why? What
- 24 is it? What did you get?
- 25 BRIAN HARTY: You just walk up to

- 1 1-25-21
- 2 it and --
- 3 TRUSTEE WALTER PRIESTLEY: Instead
- 4 of Hanna running around to the front and
- 5 taking everybody's temperature, when you
- 6 walk in, there's a probe that you just
- 7 bring your forehead up to or your --
- 8 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: Oh, yeah,
- 9 okay.
- 10 TRUSTEE WALTER PRIESTLEY:
- 11 (Continuing) -- or you (inaudible) to and
- 12 it takes --
- 13 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: They have
- 14 one of those --
- 15 TRUSTEE WALTER PRIESTLEY:
- 16 (Continuing) -- your temperature.
- 17 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: Yup.
- 18 Uh-hum.
- 19 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: And if your
- 20 temperature is above normal, it actually
- 21 goes off with bells and whistles, so...
- 22 TRUSTEE WALTER PRIESTLEY: And if
- 23 you don't get close enough, it -- instead
- of one beep, it makes two loud beeps like
- 25 get a little closer.

- 1 1-25-21
- 2 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: Uh-hum.
- 3 TRUSTEE WALTER PRIESTLEY: Just to
- 4 -- it's a lot for Hanna to run around the
- 5 counter every time somebody walks in.
- 6 Especially when the public starts coming
- 7 in.
- 8 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: Yeah, I
- 9 talked -- last time I was there, Theresa
- 10 was doing it.
- 11 STEPHEN FELLMAN: Yeah, but not
- 12 only that --
- 13 BRIAN HARTY: (Inaudible) we did
- 14 give it to Theresa, but this works great.
- 15 STEPHEN FELLMAN: Not only that,
- 16 Theresa has to go up to somebody that
- 17 might be sick --
- 18 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: Sure.
- 19 STEPHEN FELLMAN: (Continuing) --
- 20 to take --
- 21 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: Sure,
- 22 exactly right.
- 23 STEPHEN FELLMAN: That's the real
- 24 reason for this. It's awesome. I had
- 25 taken a picture of one I had at a client's

- 2 facility and brought it in and they -- I
- 3 got attacked for claiming it was \$50,000
- 4 for that thing and two weeks later, there
- 5 it is. So I planted the seed, if
- 6 anything.
- 7 Thank you, Walter.
- 8 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: Yes, thank
- 9 you, Walter.
- 10 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: All right,
- 11 so we'll -- we'll order one for DPW if --
- 12 and find out it's -- before we order it,
- 13 find out its availability because a lot of
- 14 these COVID related supplies, you know --
- 15 you know, here today, gone tomorrow.
- 16 TRUSTEE WALTER PRIESTLEY: That was
- 17 in March. Not now. You order it, it'll
- 18 be Prime the next day, two days later.
- 19 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: Okay.
- 20 TRUSTEE WALTER PRIESTLEY: And they
- 21 have more sophisticated ones in schools.
- 22 That's what the schools are using.
- 23 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: Good.
- 24 TRUSTEE WALTER PRIESTLEY: We don't
- 25 need a fancy one. Just the basic --

- 2 STEPHEN FELLMAN: No, that works
- 3 well.
- 4 TRUSTEE WALTER PRIESTLEY:
- 5 (Continuing) -- seventy dollar model.
- 6 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: That's --
- 7 yeah. We're good with that.
- 8 Okay, anything else?
- 9 (WHEREUPON, no response was heard.)
- 10 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: Okay, a
- 11 motion to go into exec.
- 12 TRUSTEE CHERYL PARISI: So moved.
- 13 TRUSTEE WALTER PRIESTLEY: Make the
- 14 motion.
- 15 TRUSTEE ANTHONY ADDEO: I'll second
- 16 it.
- 17 MAYOR RALPH EKSTRAND: Okay, all in
- 18 favor?
- 19 (WHEREUPON, there was a unanimous,
- 20 affirmative vote of the Board members
- 21 present.)
