is hereby amended for the purpose of reducing the principal amount of bonds authorized to be issued from \$4,000,000 to \$3,000,000. The Board of Trustees has determined that the full amount of bonds originally authorized shall not be required for such purpose. THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE VILLAGE OF FARMINGDALE, IN THE COUNTY OF NASSAU, NEW YORK, HEREBY RESOLVES (by the favorable vote of not less than two-thirds of all the members of said Board of Trustees) AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. The Village of Farmingdale, in the County of Nassau, New York (herein called the "Village"), is hereby authorized to acquire a parcel of real property in the Village to be used as a parking lot. The estimated maximum cost thereof, including preliminary costs and costs incidental thereto and the financing thereof, is \$1,000,000 and said amount is hereby appropriated for such purpose. The plan of financing includes the issuance of bonds in the principal amount of \$1,000,000 to finance said appropriation, and the levy and collection of taxes on all the taxable real property in the Village to pay the principal of said bonds and the interest thereon as the same shall become due and payable.

Section 2. Bonds of the Village in the principal amount of \$1,000,000 are hereby authorized to be issued pursuant to the provisions of the Local Finance Law,

Section 3. The following additional matters are hereby determined and declared:

(a) The period of probable usefulness applicable to the object or purpose for which said bonds are authorized to be issued, within the limitations of Section 11.00 a. 21 of the law, is thirty (30) years.

(b) The proceeds of the bonds herein authorized, and any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of said bonds, may be applied to reimburse the Village for expenditures made after the effective date of this resolution for the purpose for which said bonds are authorized. The foregoing statement of intent with respect to reimbursement is made in conformity with Treasury Regulation Section 1.150-2 of the United States Treasury Department.

(c) The proposed maturity of the bonds authorized by this resolution will exceed five (5) years.

Section 4. Each of the bonds authorized by this resolution, and any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of the sale of said bonds, shall contain the recital of validity as prescribed by Section 52.00 of the Law and said bonds, and any notes issued in anticipation of said bonds, shall be general obligations of the Village, payable as to both principal and interest by general tax upon all the taxable real property within the Village. The faith and credit of the Village are hereby irrevocably pledged to the punctual payment of the principal of and interest on said bonds, and any notes issued in anticipation of the

sale of said bonds, and provision shall be made annually in the budget of the Village by appropriation for (a) the amortization and redemption of the bonds and any notes in anticipation thereof to mature in such year and (b) the payment of interest to be due and payable in such year.

Section 5. Subject to the provisions of this resolution and of the Law and pursuant to the provisions of Section 21.00 of the Law relative to the authorization of bonds with substantially level or declining annual debt service, Section 30.00 relative to the authorization of the issuance of bond anticipation notes and Section 50.00 and Sections 56.00 to 60.00 and 168.00 of the Law, the powers and duties of the Board of Trustees relative to authorizing bond anticipation notes and prescribing the terms, form and contents and as to the sale and issuance of the bonds herein authorized, and of any bond anticipation notes, and as to the execution of said bonds, and the renewals of said bond anticipation notes, and as to the execution of agreements for credit enhancements, are hereby delegated to the Village Treasurer, the chief fiscal officer of the Village.

Section 6. The validity of the bonds authorized by this resolution, and of any notes issued in anticipation of the sale of said bonds, may be contested only if:

FOURTH: DETERMINING that said bonds and any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of said bonds and the renewals of said bond anticipation notes shall be general obligations of the Village; and PLEDGING to their payment the faith and credit of the Village;

FIFTH: DELEGATING to the Village Treasurer the powers and duties as to the issuance of said bonds, and any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of said bonds, or the renewals thereof; and

SIXTH: DETERMINING that the bond resolution is subject to a permissive referendum.

**TEN YEAR BOND FINANCING -** Upon a motion by Trustee Barrett and seconded by Trustee Parisi, it was unanimously,

**RESOLVED** (#2016-05-29), to approve the following: Rollover from BAN to 10 Year Bond Financing: \$1,850,000, New Parking Lot Rehabilitation Financing \$1,450,000, New Road Improvements \$250,000, New Water Department Improvements \$1,200,000 for Ten Year Bond Financing.

**NEW COMMUNICATION AND CONTROLS FOR WATER SUPPLY SYSTEM -**Upon a motion by Trustee Priestley and seconded by Trustee Parisi, it was unanimously,

**RESOLVED** (#2016-05-30), to approve to award contract to Eldor Contracting Company, as the lowest responsible bidder, for the New Communication and Controls for Water Supply System in the amount of \$99,320.00.

**BEAUTIFICATION** – Deputy Mayor Christiansen reported that the Core Committee established the following dates for planting: May 14<sup>th</sup> – the Junior Firemen will hang the flowering baskets on the light poles; May 16<sup>th</sup> - a group will work on the Main Street/Melville Road triangle; May 17<sup>th</sup> - a group will plant at Northside Park and May 21<sup>st</sup>

- many volunteers will be needed to plant the pots on Main Street, flowers at Village Green and Street Sign baskets. Planting at Gerngras Park will be done by neighboring property owners.
