


Our present water tower on Eastern Parkway has been a landmark and served us well for the past sixty years but has exhausted its useful life. The price tag to rehabilitate it approximates the cost to replace it. After careful study and with the advice from experts, your Village Board decided to replace it with a glass infused water tower. This somewhat new technology has been around for over a decade and can be seen on the north side of Southern State Parkway near Hempstead. The main advantage of this new technology is the lack of maintenance costs. Presently, the cost to clean the interior of the steel tank and paint the exterior every fifteen years requires the Village to bond the approximate \$2,500,000 cost. It is estimated that the annual maintenance cost for the new



glass infused water tower is only \$15,000. Assuming no further supply issue considerations and COVID outbreak among the workers the target date for completion of the water tower is late spring.

The glass infused water tower will be a new landmark announcing to the world that its location is in the VILLAGE OF FARMINGDALE but due to cost considerations and to the chagrin of Trustee Barrett it will NOT also say HOME OF CHAMPIONS. The water tower will be Daler green with Farmingdale in white letters.

SENATOR KEVIN THOMAS THANK YOU!



Our good friend Senator Kevin Thomas, has once again come through for the Village of Farmingdale. Senator Thomas has provided a \$500,000 grant for our Water Tower; a \$500,000 grant for Main Street to bury the overhead wires; and a \$450,000 grant for a new ambulance, an ambulance upgrade and gators for our Village Fire Department.



MAIN STREET REVITALIZATION

In early March of 2022, PSEG LI will begin work on Main Street. The Village has signed a contract with PSEG LI to put all of the electrical wires overhead underground. The project will be handled in two phases with the area south of Conklin Street to Prospect Street starting in March 2022 and Phase II to begin in March 2023 runs north of Conklin Street to South Front Street. We look forward to this much improved look for Main Street.

This much anticipated project is being funded by a \$500,000 grant from Senator Kevin Thomas.

5 CORNERS @ MAIN AND MELVILLE

The 5 Corners Park at Main and Melville is being completely renovated. New fencing, lighting, brickwork, sidewalk, shrubbery, signage and landscaping will make the area a beautiful entrance into our Village. Nassau County is providing a \$150,000 grant toward this project from a 2006 Environmental Bond Issue. Trustee Parisi is spearheading this project. It should be completed in early spring.

FIRE DEPARTMENT UPGRADES

During the past year, our fire department has been there for all of us. Now Senator Thomas is once again here to help the Village. The Village has received a \$450,000 grant for a new ambulance, an upgrade to our present ambulance, and the purchase of gators.

STORMWATER POLLUTION

- What can I do to prevent runoff pollution?**
- Reduce the volume of runoff that washes into our water supply (mostly through our storm drains). Keep pollutants safely away from the runoff's path. As a rule, only clean rain water should go into the storm drain. Here are some tips on reducing the pollutants that get into the storm water:
 - Use a car wash that recycles water or wash it on the lawn with a bucket where soapy runoff will be filtered by the lawn.
 - Sweep and compost grass clippings and leaves from the driveway, street, and walkway.
 - Keep your car well maintained. If it is leaking oil or any other fluids, have it fixed promptly. (Did you know that 1 litre of engine oil can pollute 1,000,000 litres of fresh water?)
 - Stop chlorination of pool water at least one week before emptying it, in accordance with local bylaws.
 - Pick up pet waste and encourage others to do so as well.
 - Keep your neighborhood clean by picking up litter.
 - Properly dispose of batteries, chemicals and other hazardous wastes with the Town of Oyster Bay's Stop Program.
