> The Trustees and I along with our residents want to thank Superintendent Fisch and all the members of his staff for their countless hours of service plowing, sanding and shoveling to ease travel for our residents. Trustees Barrett and Ryan join with me in congratulating Pat Christiansen and Cheryl Parisi on their reelection as Trustees of the Village. We have enjoyed an excellent working relationship over the past two years and look forward to its continuation. Construction is proceeding very quickly at Jefferson Plaza, the new mixed use development at the train station. We wish to thank all who use the LIRR for their cooperation with the parking lot alterations to accommodate the construction. We anticipate that the demolition of the SPA buildings on Main Street will be started before the end of the month to be followed by construction of the mixed use building approved by the Board last fall. This construction will occur along with a similar project by SPA on Eastern Parkway.

The Board spent a great deal of time during the spring working on the 2014-2015 Village budget. Consideration had to be given to increased pension and health insurance premiums for our employees, repairs required on our Village Hall building as well as on our DPW equipment and, of course, the ability to maintain the same services for our residents. With sharpened pencils this was accomplished while imposing a small tax increase of 1.46%.

Hopefully you have noticed all the improvements that have occurred along our Main Street including new store signs, awnings, and building facade improvements. This work has all been completed with funds from the Nassau County Community Block Grant program. The work will continue as the Village partners with the County and land owners to improve the attractiveness of our Main Street. The repaying of Main Street together with the installation of new curbing and brick work is also being done under a grant provided by Nassau County. Upon completion, many of the inadequate drainage issues at the north end of Main Street will be eliminated.

We are very pleased to welcome several new stores to our Main Street including Village Kitchen at the former Bollinger's location and Charlotte's Yogurt & Ice Cream Shop. We are looking forward to welcoming HUSH, a new restaurant being opened by Chef Marc Anthony, Café Dolce Vita and the Dark Horse Tavern in the next several weeks. I would encourage all residents to visit these new restaurants and I am sure you will enjoy all that they have to offer.

I would like to thank the Downtown Implementation Committee for organizing the second St. Patrick's Day parade in the Village. Large crowds came out to see the marchers, enjoy activities on Village Green and visit the restaurants on Main Street who offered many specials for the day. The Committee is busy planning more events for the summer and fall seasons.

On May 17th volunteers gathered at Village Hall and began the process of spring planting in our Village. Together they hung 110 baskets containing petunias on the street lights, planted wave petunias in the pots at six street signs, as well as planting 80 street and park planters with spikes, marigolds and red and purple wave petunias. In addition, 45 flats of flowers containing 2,160 plants were planted at Village Green, Northside Park, Main Street/ Melville Road triangle, and Grengras Park. Beautification is a fully volunteer event. Once again, our volunteers were joined by a detail from the Marine Corps Recruiting Substation in Hicksville under the direction of Sergeant Thomas J. Heinsohn. In addition to the Marine Corps volunteers, SPECIAL THANKS also to all the dedicated volunteers including members of the Beautification Committee, Hardscrabble Girl Scouts, Farmingdale Village Junior Firemen, Village Department of Public Works staff and Village Trustees who give of their time and talent to improve the attractiveness of our Village.

As we approach the summer season, I invite you to come and enjoy the Village Pops on Wednesday evenings, beginning on June 25th, and movie nights on Thursdays evenings, beginning on July 10th. These events are all being held on Village Green. The Fire Department is once again sponsoring a spring fair on Sunday, June 8th

GOOD STORM WATER MANAGEMENT

Stormwater Management is vital to our community and waterways.

How is stormwater pollution a problem? Storm drains (like crustaceans, and plankton. those found along curbs) do not go to wastewater treatment plants. Consider the following options for removing chlorine: Simply Water entering storm drains flows untreated into streams, rivers, stop adding chlorine to your uncovered pool and wait. Sunlight ponds, wetlands, lakes, sounds, bays, and oceans. Stormwater will help to naturally dissipate the chlorine within 10 days. Durpicks up and carries numerous pollutants into our waterways bacing that time, use a swimming pool test kit to measure chlorine. teria (pathogens), sediment, trash, automotive fluids like used oil Chemically dechlorinate the pool water. Chemicals that will and antifreeze, grass clippings, leaves, yard waste, excess fertilizquickly remove chlorine are available through pool and spa care ers, animal waste, pesticides. Many of these pollutants can cause vendors. problems in very small amounts. Polluted stormwater runoff is Lawn Care & Yard Waste so varied and so widespread that it is very difficult to address its · Apply fertilizers and pesticides exactly where you want them. sources. Avoid over spraying them onto sidewalks, driveways or streets. What can you do to prevent storm water pollution? There are

several things residents can do to prevent storm water pollution. Animal Waste

· Pick up after your pets. Dispose of pet waste properly in a trash receptacle or flush it down the toilet.

• Keep manure piles covered and on impervious surfaces

Your Septic System: Overflowing septic systems can result in pathogen pollution:

· Have your septic system inspected at least every 3 years by a professional

· Your tank pumped as recommended by the inspector (generally every 3 to 5 years).

· Household chemicals, gasoline, oil, pesticides, antifreeze, paint, etc. should be taken to the Town S.T.O.P collection sites and not flushed. Overflowing septic systems can pollute our waterways. **Reducing Runoff**

· Adjust sprinklers so that you're not watering the street or sidewalk.

· Redirect roof gutters to lawns, dry wells, or rain gardens.

• Take your car to a car wash instead of washing it on the driveway.

Pool Water

· Pool water must be dechlorinated before discharging.

· Even small concentrations of chlorine that are fine for humans can harm aquatic life. Chlorine can be very toxic to fish, small

• Reduce the amount of fertilizers you need to apply by testing the soil in your yard first.

- · Sweep up yard debris instead of washing it away.
- Bundle vard waste at the curb for pickup.

· Blow leaves and grass clippings back into your yard instead of leaving them in the street to wash down the storm drain.

· Use a compost bin to turn yard waste into a useful gardening product.

Planting

Replant bare areas to avoid soil erosion.

· Keep invasive plants from growing in your yard. Remove before they have a chance to spread.

· Avoid planting exotic plants. Select only plants that are native to this area.

Household Hazardous Waste

· Never dump anything down a storm drain. Many storm drains flow to the waterway.

· Take used oil, paint and other household hazardous waste to Town recycling centers (see Oyster Bay S.T.O.P. for times and locations).

Check your car for oil or other leaks.
